Thank you very much for taking the time to read my review of the season. My name is Tom and I am an aspiring young football journalist. I have written two full season York City reviews already (2011/12 and 2013/14) so this is my third one.

Now, this year has been a tough season for all associated with York City Football Club. After staving off the relegating threat last season very late on, York fans saw the summer as an opportunity to rebuild and perhaps try and push onto the play-offs like they managed to achieve in 2013/14. However, that was not the way it went.

Following poor summer recruitment of signings such as George Swan, Taron Hare and Eddie Nolan plus being stuck with transfer-listed trio, Femi Ilesanmi, Marvin McCoy and Anthony Straker, who were signed on 2-year deals the previous summer, City were not in the best position at the start of the season to go on and push up the league.

And this showed at the start of the season with a 3-0 defeat to Wycombe on the opening day of the season and a slow slide of results, ultimately culminating in the sacking of boss Russ Wilcox. Jackie McNamara was soon brought in, but after even worse recruitment from him in the form of young loanees such as Jordan Lussey, Mark Kitching and Lubo Satka, the slide down the league table carried on and City looked certain for relegation after successive 6-0 and 5-1 defeats to Portsmouth and Accrington Stanley respectively.

There were upturns in results such as back-to-back victories for the first time in the season at home to Notts County & Exeter City in February, however City still failed to stave off relegation and on the 23rd April City's relegation to the National League after four years in League Two had been confirmed.

The season had seen its fair share of off-field issues as well with first-team coach Richard Cresswell and player-coach Jonathan Greening mysteriously leaving the club with mutual consent just days after Greening had offered his playing services to the club for the rest of the season, fueling a lot of rumours to fly around the City camp and no doubt unrest was caused with the players didn't help with the results either. Towards the back end of the season, both Sophie and Rob McGill resigned from the board after both being part of the club for a number of years, leaving just two members of the board, Jason McGill and Ian McAndrew.

However, all these issues and fan anger directed towards manager Jackie McNamara cannot argue against the fact that both Jason McGill and Jackie McNamara are looking to get York City promoted straight back up next season. McNamara undoubtedly has more passion for the club than any manager since the days of Gary Mills and Jason McGill continues to show his support through the time and funds he puts in from his very own company, JM Packaging.

Anyway, please enjoy reading what I have to say about the season. I have reviewed every game of the season along with a variety of other features. Please enjoy and let me know what you think!

City Line Up: SF, KL, DW, SZ, MM (EN), LSu, RP (JH) JB, DT (AS), VO, RTh. snu's: FI, JC, MI, BG It's safe to say that City's season didn't get off to the greatest start in the world, as they fell 3-0 to last season's play-off runners up Wycombe. Just 7 minutes into the game, the Blues took the lead as a high ball lofted into the City penalty area was flicked on the wrong way by defender, Keith Lowe, gifting Stewart the chance to put his side 1-0 up. The next big chance came to York as Vadaine Oliver chased the ball down the right before crossing it into the box, only for midfielder James Berrett to head wide of the post. And just before the half hour mark, another defensive mix-up from the Minstermen proved costly as Wycombe's Holloway finished calmly into the bottom corner, after catching Scott Flinders off-guard in the City net. City came close again through another header, this time from Russell Penn's ball into the box, but Vadaine Oliver could only head it over the crossbar. A similar situation occurred during the second half as a Penn ball was beautiful crossed into the box, but this time it was on-loan defender Stéphane Zubar that couldn't quite finish the job; heading high and wide. And just before the hour mark, Wycombe finished off the game due to another awful defensive error from the Minstermen, as Zubar's attempted back pass to goalkeeper, Flinders ended up flying over he keeper's head and into the back of his own net. An awful start to the season for the Minstermen.

City were all prepared for a stiff challenge and this was confirmed midway through the first half as Christopher Routis got on the end of a great free kick into the box to put the League One side ahead. But this only make the Minstermen more determined and City became the dominant side. They were gifted the chance to level things once again as striker, Reece Thompson was bundled over in the penalty area, which gave midfielder Luke Summerfield the chance to level things again from the spot and as cool as you like; that's exactly what he did. Suddenly, City were on top, but were hit by another blow as left back David Tutonda's clumsy tackle gifted Bradford a chance to regain their lead from the penalty spot. But Alan Sheehan could only blast his effort over the crossbar, gifting York another lifeline, And soon, City's dominance paid off, as Luke Summerfield was fouled on the edge of the area awarding City a free kick, which James Berrett sweetly curled into the top left hand corner of the goal, meaning City had just 5 minutes of normal time to hang on for the victory. However, the pressure began to pile from Bradford and with the referee on the verge of blowing the final whistle, long-serving frontman James Hanson was on hand to equalise for the visitors and take the game to extra time. 30 minutes of extra time followed, but with limited chances taking the game to penalties. And a mixture of two fantastic saves from City keeper Flinders from Chris Routis and Tony McMahon's penalties as well as cool finishes from Keith Lowe, James Berrett, Reece Thompson and Josh Carson ensured that City would be in the hat going into Round 2 of the League Cup.

The visitors begun the brightest though, as strike duo Billy Paynter and Rakish Bingham linked up well, but Bingham's effort managed to force out a fantastic save from Flinders. City also had a good chance when Tutonda's high cross into the box met the head of Vadaine Oliver who rose above his opponent to head down to the bottom right corner of the goal, only for ex-York trialist Adam Bartlett to pull off a cracking save to keep the score level. A well-rehearsed free kick from Luke Summerfield, meeting Dave Winfield's head also nearly put City ahead, but Bartlett was the hero again as he tipped the ball over the crossbar. But, undoubtedly the best chance of the first half came for The Minstermen. Midfielder, Luke Summerfield whipped the ball into the box where Oliver was waiting to head it on to centre-back Dave Winfield, who managed to turn his marker eight yards from the goal before firing at the post, But it was cleared only as far as Vadaine Oliver, who controlled the ball well, only to volley it wide of Bartlett's goal. However, it was City wo drew first blood, as good work from Summerfield and Penn resulted in a ball into the area, where Reece Thompson had the easy job of tapping the ball into the back of the net. This only fuelled Hartlepool's desire to win the match though, and fifteen minutes later, a beautiful curling effort from Billy Paynter on the edge of the box gave Flinders no chance in the City goal and the scores were evens once again. And Pools showed no sign of stopping; they had come for three points after all. It was Bingham's run down the right which led to the ball into the box, where Michael Woods was waiting with a shot that would initially have been saved by Flinders, but a big deflection in the opposite direction from James Berrett guided the ball into the back of the net, and City failed to pick up their first point of the season.

And following a niggle to Luke Summerfield, Russ Wilcox put his faith in 17-year old Ben Godfrey in the midfield. City had the first real chance of the game, but Berrett's 30-yard effort sailed wide of the post causing ex-City keeper Artur Krysiak no trouble at all. Another chance came for The Minstermen when Tutonda's ball into the box was headed on by striker Vadaine Oliver, but Stéphane Zubar could only fire at Krysiak from six yards. Yeovil's best chance of the game came when Wakefield and Fogden linked up well only for Harry Cornick to shoot directly at Scott Flinders who parried the shot, for Zubar to clear. The only goal of the game came on 63 minutes when David Tutonda's ball into the area was cleared by the Yeovil defence as far as ex-midfielder James Berrett who's effort from outside the area took a series of bobbles and deflections but eventually found its way into the back of Krysiak's net, which would ultimately prove to be enough to give City their first three points of the season, despite late scares from Yeovil. The biggest talking point of the first half came when York defender Stéphane Zubar had to be stretchered off through injury, to be replaced by Femi Ilesanmi. However, the only real chance of the first half came when Marvin McCoy's ball into the box was headed straight at ex-City keeper Bobby Olejnik in the Exeter goal by last season's top scorer Jake Hyde. The second half begun with City dominance as Summerfield's ball into the box was smothered by Olejnik before Hyde could reach it. Exeter also went close though when Emmanuel Oyeleke's 20 yard effort went just over Flinders' bar. And suddenly it was Exeter who were dominating as Tom Nichols' pass set up Ryan Harley whose effort could only go wide of the York goal. City's best effort of the game came when David Tutonda skipped past Arron Davies and crossed a ball into the box, reaching City skipper Russell Penn who could only fire straight at former City team-mate Oleinik, Exeter later went close through a free kick right on the edge of the box which was just went wide of the City goal by inches. The game finished and City took a point home with them for the long 6-hour journey back to North Yorkshire.

York were undoubtedly massive underdogs going into the game and even with Swansea's fringe players starting the game, this was soon realised as it took less than two minutes for Swansea to take the lead when Eder's clash with Scott Flinders led to the ball falling to Nathan Dyer by the penalty spot for a simple pass into the back of the net, despite the best efforts from Dave Winfield and Keith Lowe to block the shot. The Prem side continued to use their sublime passing tactics to get run rings through City's defence and came close when Nathan Dyer's cross to Eder was blocked by Marvin McCoy and put out for a corner. But a great chance for the Swans came when Wayne Routledge was set free on goal, putting Dave Winfield in a spin before getting a shot off, which was saved magnificently by Scott Flinders. City came close in the second half though, when Vadaine Oliver's effort on goal from inside the area curled just wide of the goal. The Swans doubled their lead on 64 minutes, however when former Exeter City midfielder Matt Grimes fired on goal from outside of the area, only for a deflection from Keith Lowe to send the ball flying into the back of the net and undeservedly leaving City further behind. Manager, Russ Wilcox used the opportunity of playing against higher league opponents to bring on 17-year old midfielder Ben Godfrey, who had played just one professional game prior to this match and 18-year old striker Callum Rzonca who was yet to make his professional debut. But Rzonca's inexperience proved costly when he was outmuscled by Jordi Amat who begun at attack which resulted in substitute Marvin Emnes finished cooly past Flinders after dazzling Keith Lowe, leaving City three goals down and the game pretty much decided. City had been knocked out of the cup, but could hold their heads up high after putting on a good display against a Premier League opposition and besides the result, they had nothing to be down heartened about.

City did take the lead on just 6 minutes though, when a free kick from Luke Summerfield was swung into the box and taped in by Reece Thompson, scoring his second goal of the season past 40-year old Brian Jensen in the Mansfield goal. But it took less than ten minutes for Mansfield to level as a short corner caused a mix-up in the York defence and claims of a blatant foul on James Berrett that wasn't awarded, City were left off guard and Matt Green was left to score his first of the season from close range. And on half an hour, it became two for Mansfield as an easy through ball from Craig Westcarr fed Matt Green in nicely, who did well to take on Winfield and McCoy before lashing the ball into the bottom left hand corner of Scott Flinders' York City goal, scoring his fifth goal against the Minstermen since 2010. City came close when Marvin McCoy crossed the ball, but Russell Penn could only quide his free header wide of the post, City's best chance of the second half came when James Berrett's high corner was met by the oncoming Femi Ilesanmi, playing his third game at centre back since being converted from the left, who could only send the header wide of the post; much to the annoyance of the City fans. Mansfield very nearly finished off City by making it three when Matt Green played in Chris Clements whose 20-yard effort struck the post. City almost took the lead when James Berrett's free kick was parried by Joe Day in the County goal. But, Berrett made up for this when he capitalised on a stray Aaron Hayden pass and went on a brilliant direct forward run to the edge of the box before turning Matt Partridge and firing into the bottom left hand corner of the goal to bag his third goal of the season. Newport's best chance of the game came in the first half when a corner ended up bouncing out to Mark Byrne who struck it on the half volley only to fly over Scott Flinders' goal, but Berrett's goal was enough to make sure City were winning going into the half time break. City soon made it two, ten minutes after the restart when Luke Summerfield's free kick was flicked on by the head of Reece Thompson to get his third of the season and double the lead. And four minutes later City put the game to bed. Following good work from Reece Thompson and James Berrett, Vadaine Oliver was left with a simple tap, after Joe Day parried the ball straight into his path to earn the striker his long-awaited first goal in a City shirt, which was much deserved given his efforts during the first part of the season. And the game soon got even worse for Newport, as they were reduced to ten men when Danny Holmes was shown his second yellow card of the match following a clumsy and unnecessary mistimed tackle on Eddie Nolan leading to the defender receiving his marching orders from referee Trevor Kettle. City had won their second league game of the season and went back to North Yorkshire with three more points on the board, and also a spectacular performance to show for it.

A corner was swung in, flicked on and reached a Charlie Lee, who was surrounded by three City players, making no attempt at all to stop him from heading home his first goal of the season. As expected it was the away side that looked like they would bag the win and they did grab the first goal just before the 20 minute mark when Billy Bodin was able to cut in from the right and strike a shot with his left foot into Scott Flinders' goal and give Rovers the lead. Though many may have expected a thrashing, it did not look like that was where the game was heading, as the game seemed pretty close for the rest of the first half and early second half. That was until Bodin grabbed his second on 71 minutes with a run through the City half before taking it round Flinders and cleverly finishing into the net. It looked like the thrashing could be on the way when Jermaine Easter made it three with a simple finish round Flinders in the 80th minute. But it took just nine seconds from the resulting centre or City to grab a consolation goal when a Bradley Fewster cross was met by Kenny McEvoy sliding in to give York fans something small to cheer about and grab his second of the season. City were finished off in the 88th minute though when an edge of the box effort from Lee Mansell was powerfully struck into Scott Flinders' bottom corner to boost Rovers' promotion push and end City's home season badly.

With rumours already flying around regarding potential incomings and outgoings at the end of the season, most City fans were just looking forward to the diabolical season ending end the club being able to rebuild in the summer. Still, the game had to be played and it was. The home side almost took the lead when a bad back pass by Dave Winfield was pounced upon by Aaron Wildig, but recalled City goalkeeper Michael Ingham was able to stop it in the one-on-one situation. The follow up effort from the right hand side was also stopped by the veteran City goalkeeper. Ingham was continued to be worked very hard in the City goal and had a number of significant saves to make during the first half that kept City in the game and they paid off as towards the end of the first half, City were able to take the lead. Luke Summerfield retrieved a pass from James Berrett before passing a 20-yard effort into the bottom corner of the goal to give City the lead and maybe they would be able to finally get that long awaited second away win of the season on the final day. Morecambe restored equal measures in the 51st minute though when Jamie Devitt unleashed a brilliant 25-yard effort that even the best goalkeeper in the world would struggle to save. Morecambe looked like they could go on and win the game, but Michael Ingham really was on top form and continued to be kept very busy in the York City goal, making save after save like he had been doing for the Minstermen for years. City fans voiced their disapproval towards both player and manager when Jackie McNamara made the puzzling decision to bring Vadaine Oliver onto the pitch late on, but by then it was too late. City finished the season with just one away win and worst of all was that on the final day, City had dropped to the absolute foot of the Football League going down as the bottom team.

WHAT WENT WRONG?

From previous pages, it's clear to see for all that City have not lacked ability to score in front of goal. However, unfortunately the defence has not quite been up to the same standard and that has ultimately been the club's downfall.

At the beginning of the season, the club begun playing a 3-5-2 formation and with four good, experienced centre backs in Keith Lowe, Dave Winfield, Stéphane Zubar and John McCombe as well as youngsters George Swan and Taron Hare waiting in the wings, the club looked like they had a defence set up for the season. However, after a season-ending injury for Zubar, Keith Lowe and John McCombe having fallen out of favour by Jackie McNamara's reign and ultimately being released, Swan being deemed 'not ready' and Taron Hare being carted out on loan to Stamford, City were stuck with one good centre back in Dave Winfield.

Femi Ilesanmi was forced to cover in the centre-back position a number of times, but when McNamara finally decided to draft in some centre halves they proved to be the wrong ones. The likes of Stefan O'Connor and Lubo Satka are just a couple of examples of young defenders that have not flourished at the club this season. Although, William Boyle did look a class act when partnering Winfield at the back, but when he was recalled to Huddersfield, Kyle Cameron was drafted in as the direct replacement and he failed to live up to Boyle's standards. Boyle returned later on in the season, but never looked the same player as he was during his first spell at the club. Scot Bennett was drafted in towards the end of the season, but was only really played in midfield before it was too late. However, when partnered at the back with Winfield, he really did look the full package.

So, what exactly was wrong with the centre of City's defence? Well towards the beginning of the season, it was hard to pinpoint exactly what was the cause of the Lowe and McCombe downfall, but neither managed to force their way into the new manager's plans. The pair both seemed to have lost a yard of pace and fitness; two things that had always been two of Lowe's greatest qualities. Meanwhile, George Swan benefited from the two being dropped as he earnt his first appearances for the club. His debut at Barnsley was memorable as he showed City fans the fight and desire they'd been missing at centre-back all season. But he failed to show the same form again and after being involved in the 6-0 demise at Portsmouth and the 5-1 defeat at home to Accrington, it's not hard to believe that he never played for the club again before his end of season release. Taron Hare, meanwhile never managed to force his way any further than the subs' bench after his questionable signing by Russ Wilcox in the summer of 2015 and was also released at the end of the season.

Even when new defenders were brought in though, the same mistakes seemed to be made. The most obvious one seemed to be the lack of ability to stop a simple cross. So many times this season, we have seen a simple ground cross put in from the wing that defenders should be clearing in their sleep, but City's defenders seem to have always struggled, which is definitely a key reason for the downfall of City's defence this season. The lack of pace and fitness seen with Lowe and McCombe were also replicated with the likes of Stefan O'Connor and Mark Kitching, who were drafted in prior to the Accrington game. These all seem to be qualities that City have

not been able to get rid of all season, apart from at the back end when Dave Winfield was partnered in defence with Scot Bennett, but by then it was too late.

Furthermore, it's not only the centre backs that have suffered this season. The full backs at times have been no better. When the 3-5-2 system was being played City started the season with loanee David Tutonda and the transfer-listed Marvin McCoy in the two wing-back roles. The fact that Wilcox had to settle for what he had with McCoy showed that there was not much hope for the club. Tutonda however seemed to show promise, but too often he would much rather pull out a stepover instead of a killer pass, which didn't help his case and was a reason for his early return to Cardiff. Another incumbent of a full back role this season was Eddie Nolan, who filled the right back role ahead of McCoy a number of times, although Nolan often found himself playing in midfield at times too. He was another frustrating player, with glimpses of talent definitely being shown, but he seemed to put on a bit of 'timber' during his time at the club, which resulted in him being dropped early in McNamara's reign and he was another one that failed to survive the new City's manager's mass cull of experienced players.

Femi Ilesanmi spent the majority of the season filling the left back role and similarly to Tutonda he was a frustrating one. He showed ability and passion when bursting forward down his left wing and rarely lost the ball when bursting in to the opposing penalty area. However, too many silly mistakes and failures led to him receiving a bit of abuse from the City faithful. Similarly to McCoy, he also began the season on Wilcox's transfer list but managed to find his way into the team.

Another full back to have spent a long time playing in their position was Luke Hendrie, who was drafted in from Burnley on loan after the expiry of Stefan O'Connor's loan. Hendrie was a virtual ever-present for the rest of the season apart from when he received a three game ban and also confusingly lost his place to Lubo Satka for the away game at AFC Wimbledon. He was one of the bright sparks in City's team this season though for the time he spent in the side. His ability to put in a cross and make a run forward was high and he certainly provided moments of excitement for City fans. A number of fans were reminded of ex-loanee Bradley Halliday when watching the full back play. Hendrie is one of the few loanees that would definitely be welcome back at Bootham Crescent.

Josh Carson, Anthony Straker, Kyle Cameron, Jordan Lussey and Lubo Satka all also filled in at full back at various points throughout the season, but all managed to prove why that is not their first choice position. And all the chopping and changing from McNamara in the defence certainly won't have helped the side to gel or grow in ability, which is a major reason for the club's downfall this season.

In conclusion, the club has suffered massively this season from the defence. The likes of Bradley Fewster and Lewis Alessandra have kept the forward line up and running, but the back line has suffered from lack of experience, lack of ability and lack of match fitness. But the largest reason has to be the lack of passion, pride, commitment and desire. Only few players have looked proud to wear the City shirt this season and put in enough effort to make the fans recognize how much the club means to them. And a note to Jackie, there is absolutely no excuse for players who do not care. As far as we fans care, send them back to their respective clubs or get rid; there is no place for laziness and lack of pride at York City Football Club.

PLAYER RATINGS

Scott Flinders (5/10) – Played all but three games throughout a tough and torrid season for City's defence and though he has pulled off a few remarkable saves, he has done more bad than good; letting in way too many shots that have simply spilled through his hands, hence why City fans dubbed him 'Butterflinders' by the end of the season

Marvin McCoy (2/10) – Began the season on Russ Wilcox's transfer list, but managed to find his way back into the team, much to the confusion of City's supporters. His lack of ability was clear for all to see and he was always reliable to give away silly chances. Sent packing early in McNamara's reign.

Femi Ilesanmi (4/10) – Another one that began the season on the transfer list, but unlike McCoy, Femi found his way off it and lasted the whole season at the club. After an up and down first season, he was determined to right all of his wrongs and he looked like he may do that with a few stunning performances in which he looked as much an attacking threat as he did a defensive rock. However, he returned to his old self in the second half of the season, giving away silly balls and clearly lacking in ability and fight.

James Berrett (6/10) – One of Wilcox's more successful signings of the summer; Berrett was a real attacking threat from midfield. After scoring three goals early on in the season though, he seemed to quiet down a bit and was dropped a couple of times in McNamara's reign. Always a reliable midfielder though and though he had his quiet matches, he was usually one of the team's more consistent men.

John McCombe (3/10) – Spent 9 of the first 12 games of the season as an unused substitute and the other three not in the matchday squad at all. However, took his chance when offered it, scoring a goal on his first game of the season and gaining him a run of six games in the team. He was dropped after this though and due to lack of match fitness, he never made a McNamara matchday squad and was released early into his time as manager.

Scot Bennett (6/10) – A calm, experienced head in midfield and at the back for the club, but was not brought in early enough to really make a difference, as McNamara had preferred to sign the likes of young players such as Kyle Cameron and Matty Dixon. He was a reliable player though and looked comfortable playing in both midfield and defence. It's a massive shame that he wasn't at the club all season to really make an impact.

Eddie Nolan (3/10) – One of Wilcox's poor summer signings. He featured in both midfield and right back for the Minstermen, but looked equally unfit and uncomfortable at both, and besides a goal of the season contender at Stevenage, he did little to justify his selection in the City shirt. Another one to be booted out by McNamara.

Lubo Satka (2/10) – One of the poor loan signings brought in by Jackie McNamara. Lubo looked absolutely terrified every time he received the ball and he lacked strength, pace and fight. He doesn't look to have a massively bright future in the game unless he improves these aspects, which could perhaps improve as he grows in maturity and experiences a bit more of the professional game.

Michael Coulson (6/10) – Has been so consistent over his four seasons at the club, but once again his season was thwarted by a series of injury setbacks. Despite this, he still managed to grab his joint highest goals tally in a season for the club with 7 goals and was always able to pull a stunner out of absolutely nowhere. For big parts of the season, he was City's brightest attacking threat going forward and it's no doubt that when he was injured, City's performances were affected.

Luke Summerfield (6/10) – Perhaps unfairly, Luke has been the target of a lot of abuse from fans this season, but the fact that he is one of the more experienced players in the squad will have contributed to this. One of the squad's more creative players; he is usually able to pick out a pass from almost anywhere on the pitch. He seems to have suffered a lot set-piece wise this season however, compared to the quality of his free kicks and corners last season. He still managed to end the season joint second in City's goalscoring charts however with 8 goals, albeit four have come from the penalty spot.

Vadaine Oliver (4/10) – Begun the season very well forging an old fashioned front two big-little partnership with Reece Thompson. He is always reliable to win everything in the air, which is perhaps why he suffered under Jackie McNamara's footballing style of fast flowing football. However, he lacked energy or effort when given sporadic appearances under McNamara and was always the first man for criticism in the manager's post-match interviews. He scored just one goal in nearly five months in the second half of the season, but still finished top of the goalscorer charts, which explains how well he did under Russ Wilcox in the first half of the season.

Russell Penn (6/10) – Similarly to Summerfield, the reliable skipper came under a lot of criticism from areas of the City ground at the end of the season. This could also be judged unfair as he showed the same command of City's midfield that he's shown for the last three years in a City shirt and even discovered his goalscoring boots towards the end of the season, scoring 3 goals in 7 appearances, when prior to that he had managed just 2 goals in 94 Minstermen appearances.

Josh Carson (4/10) – He began the season with City fans expecting him to be the regular starter in left wing back in Wilcox's 3-5-2 wing back system. However, this wasn't to be and he suffered from injury, lack of form and lack of match fitness. Never lost his passion and fight for the club when given the chance though, but he has never looked quite the exciting player he looked in 2013/14 before he picked up his cruciate injury away in the 1-0 victory at Portsmouth. Most City fans still seem to have respect for his massive efforts that he put in both on and off the pitch, even when sometimes his ability didn't quite match up to his effort.

Bryn Morris (4/10) – He was the only signing of the one-game Richard Cresswell reign and looked to add a lot of attacking threat going forward. Unfortunately, City fans only got to see him in four games before McNamara sent him back to parent club, Middlesbrough to free up space for his own loan signings. Definitely a name to look out for in the future though.

Derek Riordan (1/10) – Undoubtedly the most puzzling and bizarre signing of the season by manager Jackie McNamara was to bring in this guy from Scotland. He hadn't had a club for a year and had scored just five professional goals in as many years, thus causing confusion between City fans. His on-pitch ability was no better, and he did absolutely nothing in the 3 substitute appearances and one start he made for the club.

Anthony Straker (2/10) – Following a three-month loan spell at Motherwell at the back end of the 2014/15 season, he returned to the club determined to fight for the left wing back spot with the likes of David Tutonda, Femi Ilesanmi and Josh Carson. But he never really made his mark all season and though he assisted a couple of goals, he was another that was carted off early into McNamara's reign.

George Swan (2/10) – Was signed by Wilcox, but failed to make an appearance under him. He was finally given his chance by McNamara though in the away game at League One Barnsley and staked a huge claim on the centre back position for City, but his performances spiraled downwards from there, with him being part of the defence that lost 6-0 at Portsmouth and 5-1 to Accrington.

Keith Lowe (3/10) – City's Mr. Reliable came into the season as the newly crowned 'Clubman of the Year'. He began the season as the first name on City's team sheet for this reason, but he seemed to lose confidence for some reason and ended up being the first of the many experienced players to not survive McNamara's mass squad cull. Perhaps unfairly treated to some extent, but there's no doubt that some of his performances this season were absolute shockers.

Kyle Cameron (4/10) – One of McNamara's more successful young loanees. Along with Satka, Cameron arrived from Newcastle United, but unlike his fellow Toon, Cameron managed to find a regular starting spot in the team, flicking between centre back and left back. He lacks in experience, which certainly explains some of his blunders, of which he made a fair few, but overall he certainly has the potential to go on and achieve good things. Another one that could be a name to remember. Don't be surprised if we see him playing on loan at perhaps a top-half League One side next season.

Dave Winfield (7/10) – He's been City's one rock at the back all season. Begun the season as the main centre half and despite McNamara's mass mid-season cull of experienced defenders, he managed to survive and remained the main centre half by the end of the season. He has saved the club a number of points this season, with incredible last ditch blocks and tackles, deservedly earning him the Clubman of the Year award. Definitely been a bright light in a very very dark room for City this season.

Jake Hyde (2/10) – The club top scorer in 2014/15 was expected by fans to kick on during this season and improve on his tally of 10 goals from the previous year. However, the complete opposite happened and instead of improving he actually got worse. He spent more time injured than he did on the pitch and even when he was on the pitch, the only positive moment we can easily recall was a shot against the post. One of City's major disappointments this season.

Michael Collins (4/10) – Brought in by Russ Wilcox as an experienced replacement for the concussed Luke Summerfield in early October. He showed his experience in keeping a cool head in midfield. However, he would often drift out of the game and we would fail to see much of him. Still, he had the ability and was certainly not one of the worse signings of the season.

Ntumba Massanka (1/10) – This guy, however, undoubtedly was one of the worse signings of the season. He came in with an impressive goalscoring record at Under-21 level for Burnley, however he failed to adapt to the requirements of professional football, explaining why he only got one start and two substitute appearances before being sent back to his parent club before the proposed end of his move.

Reece Thompson (3/10) – He was an excitable prospect when he arrived on trial from North Ferriby United and the start of his season was brilliant after scoring three goals early on and forging a strong partnership up front with Vadaine Oliver. However, a 'long-term illness' and 'personal issues' caused him to be out for a long time and when he finally returned, his substitute appearances never quite lived up to the standards he set at the beginning of the season.

Rhys Turner (3/10) – Another one of Wilcox's loan signings that was returned to his parent club at the start of McNamara's reign to free up loan spots. He begun quite nervous and shy in front of goal, but after grabbing an open goal in the home match against Oxford United, he grew in confidence and was looking the real deal before being sent back to Oldham Athletic to be replaced by the much more lethal forward man, Bradley Fewster.

Matty Dixon (2/10) – Following the sale of Ben Godfrey, Jackie McNamara brought in Hull City midfielder, Dixon as a direct replacement. However, he never lived up to Godfrey's standards and always looked nervous and failed to make an impact when receiving the ball, explaining why he was limited to just a handful of appearances.

Michael Ingham (4/10) – Now in his eighth season with the club, the long serving fans favourite has taken the role of second-choice goalkeeper over the last couple of years. This year was no different as he only actually played three games, letting in 7 goals in the first two. However, he showed more of his old self on the last day of the season to make a few wonderful saves and keep the score to 1-1. His passion, pride and commitment for the club can never be doubted.

Callum Rzonca (3/10) – Very hard to judge someone that made just two substitute appearances all season before being sent out on loan, but in both of them and pre-season he showed a lot of energy and promise to present a lot of potential to the City faithful. Will perhaps progress in the coming years.

Ben Godfrey (4/10) – Another one that progressed through the youth academy, but unlike Rzonca, Godfrey earnt himself a good run in the team. He perhaps lacked attacking threat at times and showed a lot of nerves. But with the more games he played, he seemed to grow in confidence and ability and eventually he earnt himself a move to Premier League, Norwich City in a deal that could rise up to £1 million for the Minstermen.

Lewis Alessandra (7/10) – A truly class act. City fans were delighted when the loan signing was announced of the experienced League forward man. He showed why City fans were so excited by scoring on his City debut and though he only scored one more goal in his next ten games for the club, he showed energy, creativity, hunger and fight which was something City's forward line had been lacking all season. Like Scot Bennett though, it was a shame that he came into the team so late as it turned out to be a bit too late to make the massive difference that was needed to keep the club in the Football League. He would be a huge coup if City could keep him foir next season though in the National League. It seems unlikely however, given his experience and ability at League Two level.

David Tutonda (2/10) – Following the placing of Femi Ilesanmi on the transfer list, Tutonda was meant to be the main left back for the season. However, he was sent back to parent club, Cardiff early into McNamara's reign. His major downfall has to be the fact that instead of making the crucial final pass, he'd much rather whip out an unnecessary stepover. This will surely improve as he gains more experience.

Luke Hendrie (5/10) – One of McNamara's more successful signings was Burnley right back Hendrie. After releasing both McCoy and Nolan, while O'Connor's loan had expired, Hendrie came with little to live up to. Though he made a few silly mistakes, these were clearly due to lack of experience and on his day he could destroy a winger, as he was strong in the tackle and had a lot of pace. Just like Kyle Cameron, don't be surprised if you see him on loan at perhaps a League One side this time next season.

Emile Sinclair (1/10) – City fans were amused at the start of the season when manager Wilcox branded Sinclair, Hyde and Oliver as 'top-class strikers'. But following Sinclair's performances during the second half of last season, City fans saw this as a laughable comment and they were proved right as Sinclair did absolutely nothing to warrant a place in the team. Luckily, he was injured a lot of the time and for the second half of the season he was out on loan at National League Guiseley. In other words – absolutely hopeless.

Jonathan Greening (3/10) – Ex-Premier League star Greening, who had been on the City books as coach for a number of months, was asked to come out of retirement by boss Jackie McNamara and it was very easy to see why. His command in the centre of midfield along with his experience and ability made a massive difference to the club in the few games he played, before getting sent off at Portsmouth. And just before his suspension was due to run out, he left the club mysteriously by 'mutual consent' and would never play again.

William Boyle (3/10) – Boyle was the first loan signing by manager McNamara, being drafted in from Huddersfield. He started off nervously, but eventually grew into his game and forged a good partnership at the back with Winfield. However, unfortunately his loan was cut short and though he returned later in the season, he never quite hit the same heights he'd reached during his first spell.

Bradley Fewster (7/10) – Such were the quality of his performances during the second half of the season, it's hard to believe that he didn't actually join the club until late-November. Still, Fewster gave the attack what they had been missing all season in the form of a calm head in front of goal and after scoring 5 goals in February playing in a very weak City side, he even managed to earn himself the League Two Player of the Month award. Although he drifted out of games at times and sometimes wouldn't be seen for a good portion of the game, he possessed the raw talent that has been rare from loan players at City throughout the season. Undoubtedly he has a huge future ahead of him and it really wouldn't be surprising to see him ripping nets in the Premier League within the next 3-5 years.

Kenny McEvoy (4/10) – McEvoy was one of the five loan players brought in by McNamara prior to the 5-1 thrashing by Accrington Stanley. However, unlike some of those five, McEvoy showed some serious talent and had the pace that could terrorize any defence on his day, hence why McNamara made him loan move permanent in the January transfer window. He enjoyed a good run in the team, however was very harshly treated by McNamara at the end of the season, who claimed that McEvoy 'lacked the fight for first team football', which baffled many City fans.

Mark Kitching (1/10) – Similarly to McEvoy, Kitching was one of the five loan players brought in before the Accrington game by McNamara. However, it's hard to judge his quality since he played just one game and that was at left back in a 5-1 defeat, so clearly a defence letting in 5 goals in one game justifies getting a score of just one out of ten.

Stefan O'Connor (2/10) – O'Connor came in with a good reputation after making a Champions League appearance for Arsenal against Galatasaray just a year before. However, after being one of the young defenders in the defeat against Accrington, no doubt his confidence was knocked. Unlike Kitching, he did feature again though at both centre back and right back, but never instilled much confidence to City fans as he lacked pace, energy, effort and strength; all necessary features of a defender. **Jordan Lussey (1/10)** – Lussey is in the same boat at Mark Kitching, in that they both played just once in the defence that let in five goals against Accrington Stanley. But, he didn't even last all game before getting injured, so it's impossible to judge this guy on anything apart from the fact he was part of a defence that conceded five goals in a game.

Danny Galbraith (4/10) – Galbraith was Jackie Mac's first permanent signing, being brought in to add excitement into City's wide areas along with Kenny McEvoy. Galbraith didn't provide much hope for City fans. But, he did grow and after a stunning last minute winner at Stevenage, he seemed to improve and grow into the team. But, towards the end of the season he seemed to fall back into his old habits of losing the ball easily and drifting out of the game. Still, if he can put right some of his small mistakes, he undoubtedly could do well for the club in the National League. **Stéphane Zubar (4/10)** – Following a great first season on loan from Bournemouth, City were delighted to get Zubar back on loan. And though he scored an own goal in the first game of the season, he still managed to get back to how he played last season and City fans were gutted when his season was cut short by injury just four matches in and he was sent back to his parent club. When he gets back to full fitness though, I'm sure he'd be very welcome back at Bootham Crescent

at any point.
